Our mission is to assist residents with the conservation, management and wise use of natural resources in Washtenaw County.

It is hard to believe that we are now looking back at the close of 2020. As a community and as a country we have been through enormous challenges that caused disruptions across all aspects of daily life. Like most individuals and organizations, the WCCD's grand plans for 2020 required major adaptation. I can wholeheartedly say that our board of directors, staff, volunteers and partners rose to the new challenges presented by the pandemic and were still able to assist many residents in Washtenaw County with applying conservation on the ground!

One of the first major impacts of the pandemic for us was having to cancel the majority of our largest annual event: the Spring Tree & Shrub distribution. Despite this, we were still able to distribute 574 fruit trees, 6,642 native plants and many gallons of stock fish. This October we coordinated a second event, distributing over 7,300 conifer trees and 4,640 native plants. Overall, we were able to assist 552 residents with accessing trees, shrubs and plants in the midst of a pandemic while streamlining a safe process for preparing and distributing orders.

Our educational efforts were impacted in 2020 but not before we were able to host two important seminars. In February of 2020 we hosted a Conservation Agriculture seminar in partnership with Michigan State University Extension and the Washtenaw County Farm Bureau. Organics and Alternative Markets for Field Crops featured a panel of experts discussing the current organics market as well as crops like small grains and hemp. For our avid community conservationists, we hosted a Pollinator Gardens seminar in March of 2020 on species selection and design for encouraging native pollinators in the garden.

On August 4th, 76% of Washtenaw residents approved of a countywide millage to support the work of the Conservation District. This was the first time since the WCCD was established in 1948 that the WCCD had placed a millage question on the ballot. Receiving this general support will allow our organization to expand to more effectively address resource concerns of Washtenaw County residents, especially as needs are changing and adapting in this present climate.

We have many exciting things to look forward in 2021– a series of virtual seminars and webinars on various topics, Spring and Fall Tree & Native Plant Distributions, the Second Annual Native Plant Expo & Marketplace, launch of the School & Community Habitat Grant Program as well as a countywide assessment we conduct on resident's resource concerns. We look forward to growing together in 2021 and finding new and innovative ways to engage with conservation and each other.






NRCS: Putting the Farm Bill to Work

The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Ann Arbor Field Office works very closely with the WCCD. The NRCS Ann Arbor Field Office coordinates 2018 Farm Bill Programs. This entails completing conservation plans for landowners, submitting program applications to the state office, and awarding financial assistance through the Environmental Quality Assistance Program (EQIP), Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) and the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP). WCCD staff assists NRCS by directing and guiding producers towards appropriate programs for their operations, ultimately leading to conservation on the ground. Specific technical areas of assistance include developing conservation in Washtenaw County on 3,893 acres for a total of \$2,858,840.17 in payments. These payments were applied to farmland preservation, cover cropping, conservation cover, brush management, seasonal high tunnels and more.

The first step to implementing conservation on the ground is to work with NRCS and Conservation District staff to complete a conservation plan. This helps to identify the landowner's goals, all resource concerns, and develop a plan to address those concerns. In 2020, more than 1,798 acres of conservation practices were written into conservation plans and will be applied in 15 townships in our county. Once implement-

plans, and working through the application and implementation process step by step with producers.

Demand for NRCS conservation planning and cost-share programs stayed strong through 2020. The NRCS field office expanded their staff capacity by hiring two additional Soil Conservationists: Katy Beaven and Ashlii Holloway. In 2020, 27 contracts were completed



ed, thousands of acres of conservation practices will improve surface and ground water quality, soil health, wildlife habitat and overall improved resource management.

2020 MAEAP in Washtenaw County

The Michigan Agricultural Environmental Assurance Program (MAEAP) in Washtenaw County has experienced exponential growth over the past few years. MAEAP is a program that works directly with landowners and farmers to voluntarily reduce environmental pollution and risk and maximize productivity while protecting soil and water resources.

Technicians work with landowners on risk reductions practices, designing and implementing various planning tools for managing nutrients and forests. Risk reduction practices include everything from ensuring fuel is stored properly and won't leak into ground water, to calculating the amount of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium being applied to the field. Ultimately, many landowners can achieve MAEAP verification which is an acknowledgement by the State of Michigan that the landowner has met environmental and management standards.






Figure 1: Historical verifications for Washtenaw County

FY 2018 and FY 2019 were record setting years for MAEAP within Washtenaw County, with 23 and 27 total verifications respectfully. While 2020 was not a record setting year, it was still above the average for the county as seen in Figure 1 below. In 2020, 235 total risk reduction practices were implemented and the total acres of all verified farms (verified & re-verified) was nearly 500 acres.

WCCD, in partnership with Michigan State University Extension, hosted our first Virtual Field Day on Grazing on October 13th at Baseline Farm in Webster Township. As part of the MAEAP program, WCCD hosts an annual field day each year to highlight successful MAEAP practices in particular and conservation practices in general. Over 70 people participated in the field day from around the State of Michigan.

In 2021 we will be continuing to work with new landowners on risk reductions and verifications as well as working with landowners that are ready for re-verification. This is a process that happens every 5 years for individuals that have already achieved verification but require an update. Re-verification is critical to long term impact in order to assist the landowner with addressing evolving resource concerns and any important changes to an operation.

Keynote presentation: Have you seen a new type of plant or animal that has "suddenly appeared" out of nowhere? It might be an invasive species. Once an invasive species becomes established in an area, it becomes expensive and very time consuming to eradicate! JLW CISMA Coordinator, Dr. Shikha Singh will highlight a few invasive species found in Washtenaw County, as well as a few that are knocking on Michigan's door. She will also share resources available to the community to identify and report potential species.
