

Our mission is to assist residents with the conservation, management and wise use of natural resources in Washtenaw County.

When I meet people, it's very rewarding to describe to them the work of the Washtenaw County Conservation District (WCCD), a unique local unit of government established in 1948. Our mission is to assist residents with the conservation, management, and wise use of natural resources in Washtenaw County, and we do that through a growing variety of events, projects, and programming.

This 2023 report outlines great strides made by the WCCD toward goals outlined in both the Resilient Washtenaw and the WCCD 2026 Strategic plans.

- Trees play a critical role in both the Resilient Washtenaw Plan and our 2026
 Strategic Plan. In 2023 we sent 45,505 trees and shrubs home to be planted by residents in their communities.
- During the Fourth Annual Native Plant Expo & Marketplace, the WCCD and partners engaged 2,250 attendees and in partnership with SE Michigan native plant nurseries, distributed over 21,000 native plants. See page 6 for more on this event.
- In 2023 we launched MiFarmLink, a website and project dedicated to protecting Michigan farmland by shepherding it into the hands of new and existing farmers. For a full list of MiFarmLink successes in 2023 see page 9.
- Our farmer programs team also worked directly with farmers and residents to apply over 2,500 acres of conservation practices on the ground in the form of cover crops, buffer strips, pollinator habitat, and more. See pages 4 and 5 for more on our farmer programs successes.
- The WCCD is able to contribute to our combined ambitious climate and conservation goals partly due to the countywide millage passed by 76% of voters in August 2020. For every \$1 levied from county taxpayers in 2023, the WCCD secured an additional \$1.16 from outside sources. In 2024, we project to secure \$1.64 for every \$1 levied.

NPEM Highlights

In 2023, we hosted the largest Native Plant Expo & Marketplace (NPEM) yet, with **31 vendors** including **10 native plant nurseries**, local businesses, nonprofits, and local government.

New to the event, we hosted food trucks, an educational speaker stage, and a fun festival atmosphere! We counted over **2250 attendees** during the four-hour event, shattering the previous year's count of 1600.

The event included our Spring Native Plant Pre-sale distribution of 400 orders totaling 13,282 plants, and 2,888 milkweed plants were given away to attendees (see page 3 for additional details).

2023 Educational Events Recap

In 2023, the WCCD hosted **12 educational opportunities** for the general public and **9 for farmers**, attracting nearly **500 participants** and generating close to **1,000 views** on our YouTube channel. The events covered a variety of topics in multiple formats, including webinars, hands-on workshops, in-person seminars, and informal meetings, located in different areas of the County. We also enjoyed interacting with over **550 attendees** at **15 events** which we co-hosted with partner organizations or at which we presented. A few of the highlights included:

- How to Assess, Manage, and Preserve Your Land traveling presentation with partner organizations making the rounds to every Township in the County – online resources coming soon!
- Restoring Nature with Prescribed Fire webinar event detailing why and how prescribed burns are done safely with David Borneman
- Multiple friendly Coffee & Conservation meetings aimed at bringing farmers together to learn from one another and share techniques and practices at various farms, such as: Zilke Vegetable Farm in Milan, Blue Barn Meadows in Ann Arbor, and Rustic Roots Farm in Dexter
- Do You Need an Arborist or a Forester? webinar answering submitted questions to our assembled panel of experts
- A festive Washtenaw Field Day at Noble Organic Farm in Saline where farmers learned about soil health, viewed a demo of alternative pest management technology, and perused vendors

Butterfly Milkweed Giveaway Recap

Thanks to a **\$5,000 donation** from two individuals with a long history in conservation, the WCCD had the unique opportunity to offer free milkweed plants (*Asclepias spp.*) at the NPEM! The migratory monarch Butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*), an iconic and charasmatic indicator species which recently received the globally endangered status, depends on milkweed as a larval host plant.

2023 School and Community Habitat Grant

The WCCD's School & Community Habitat Grant (SCHG) assists with the establishment of native plants and the creation of wildlife habitat. Since its inception in 2021, the program has provided almost \$10,000 in consultation and plant materials to 11 awardees and helped to coordinate over 270 hours of volunteer effort.

In the 3rd round of the SCHG, we received ten completed applications for projects located in four municipalities. Our grant committee selected four organizations' projects to be awarded a total of about \$7,000 in consulting services and plant materials in 2024.



Past SCHG awardees and their project descriptions are available on our website. In 2023, all four of the 2022 Habitat Grant awardees finalized planting their projects and provided their reports. They included two non-profits, a municipality community center, and a public school. They received almost \$5,500 in consulting services and plant materials from the WCCD as well as an outpouring of community support in donations of time, materials, and skill!

Farmer Cost-Share Program Report

The WCCD launched a farmer cost-share program in 2021 to assist Washtenaw producers in implementing best management practices on their property. In 2023, twelve applications were approved, assisting a diverse group of producers with addressing resource concerns in their operations. Best management practices such as soil testing, cover crops, forestry management plans and pasture establishment were some of the practices approved for funding and supported through millage dollars.

2023 Farmer Cost-Share Practices



The Cost-Share Program will continue in fiscal year 2024 with applications accepted quarterly instead of monthly. This change is a result of the popularity of the program and the need to take more time to properly assess incoming applications. 2023 MAEAP Summary

The Michigan Agriculture Environmental Assurance Program (MAEAP) is an innovative, proactive program that helps farms of all sizes and all commodities voluntarily prevent or minimize agricultural pollution risks such as overapplication of fertilizers, applying fertilizers/pesticides too close to open water or

wetlands, manure storage issues, etc. Reducing these risks can increase the productivity of the farm, while also protecting the environment for us all. This is especially important in Washtenaw County, which lies in the Great Lakes drainage basin.

MAEAP had another successful year in Washtenaw County and continues to grow in popularity! A total of 22 verifications were completed by the WCCD on 12 farms and properties totaling approximately 2,750 acres, and several of the farms were new to the program. Although farm operations are still the heart of MAEAP, many landowners are also realizing the importance of proper stewardship of their forest and wetland habitats by participating in the Forest Wetland Habitat (FWH)

System of MAEAP. The FWH System made up a large proportion of the new Assessments, Verifications and Risk Reduction Practices, and this is a testament to the work being done by landowners of all sizes, stepping up and developing plans to protect habitats on their property.

Equipment & Tool Rental Program: New & Improved "Lending Library"

During our first full year renting out the Truax No-Till Grass Drill for conservation cover crops and restoration plantings, there were seven renters of the drill which planted 65 acres: 31 acres pasture, 30 acres cover crop, and 4 acres pollinator planting. Additionally, the WCCD purchased a Tree Seedling Transplanter, capable of planting 300 seedlings / hour. It was rented three times and planted over 1050 tree seedlings.

We launched a new Lending Library website in spring of 2023, allowing residents to easily browse and reserve the No-Till Drill, Tree Transplanter, books, and 20 hand tools including tools for

soil testing, herbicide application, invasive removal, pruning, and planting. The Herbicide Application tools are offered in collaboration with the JLW CISMA. With the new online system and outreach, resident participation doubled from 2022!

The tools and equipment in the Lending Library are available to borrow or rent throughout the year.

2023 Watershed Work

The WCCD has been significantly engaged in two watershed projects in 2023: Ottawa Stony North Watershed Management Plan (OSN) and Saline River Headwaters Buffer Easement Pilot Project. In partnership with Monroe Conservation District (MCD), and LimnoTech (a local environmental consultant), the WCCD staff continued to make progress on field data collection. The steering committee established for the project, and composed of township, city and county officials, met quarterly to review and assess findings in real time. Several focus groups were also held to gather specific feedback and understand the needs of various groups within the watershed (i.e. farmers, water resource employees, residents). With data collection completed, the plan will be drafted using the data and feedback collected. A final draft will be submitted to the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy (EGLE) in spring of 2024 with the intention to apply for implementation funding for the plan in autumn of 2024; allowing the practices and actions suggested in the watershed management plan to be implemented in the community.



The Saline River Headwaters Buffer Easement Pilot project aims to pay landowners for a twenty-foot easement along any drain, stream or waterway. The WCCD contacted dozens of landowners within the watershed in 2023. A few acres are set to be enrolled in the project but won't be planted until spring of 2024. If the project is successful, an expanded footprint could see a similar project take place in the Western Lake Erie Basin.

JLW CISMA Recap

The Jackson Lenawee Washtenaw Cooperative Invasive Species Management Area (JLW CISMA) is an invasive species focused organization that operates in those three counties. Funding from the Michigan Invasive Species Grant Program and the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative allows the JLW CISMA to survey and manage invasive species, assist residents in identifying unknown flora and fauna; provide training opportunities to partners, non-profit organizations, and local staff; and create a variety of educational materials aimed at invasive species identification and prevention.




In 2023 the JLW CISMA completed 115 engagement opportunities including events, seminars, training sessions, phone support, etc.) where the JLW CISMA spoke to 1309 people directly. The JLW CISMA has been able to reach 65,237 people through 508 passive efforts (such as email, social media, mailings etc.), survey over 500 acres of land and identify beech leaf disease, hemlock woolly adelgid.

All residents of the Washtenaw County Conservation District (Washtenaw County) who are of legal age and have demonstrated residency by one (1) piece of identification may vote by casting 1 ballot at the annual meeting on January 18th, 2024, 5:30pm-8:30pm at the Ypsilanti Freighthouse, 100 Market Pl, Ypsilanti, MI 48198.

Residents may also vote by requesting an absentee ballot by mail, or filling out a ballot at the WCCD office starting Monday, December 5th, 2023 until the deadline: January 18, 2024 at the annual meeting.

Two director positions are up for election:

- 1 year term (Serving remainder of an existing term through 1/16/2025)
- 4-year term (full term through 1/21/2027)







Stabilizing the Future of Michigan Agriculture

Often, heirs of legacy farmers do not want to enter agriculture, while new generation farmers rarely inherit land and struggle to find affordable parcels close to market centers. To slow the loss of Michigan's farmland, it's necessary to bridge the gap between farmland owners and seekers. The Washtenaw County Conservation District (WCCD) has partnered with Ottawa County to launch MiFarmLink, a website and farmer support program administered by the WCCD that connects farmland owners with farmland seekers. MiFarmLink provides detailed listings of agricultural land for sale as well as information on succession planning, mentorship, and support services. With nearly 50 examples of farm links across the country, this way of passing land onto its next steward is not a new idea. MiFarmLink builds on this model to bring together Michigan farmers to keep farmland in cultivation.



Bridging the Gap Between New and Legacy Farmers

With approximately 1,200 farms on 180,000 acres, strong local markets and multiple food and farm business support organizations, Washtenaw County is the ideal place to pilot Michigan's first farm link program. Additionally, the county has numerous publicly funded farmland preservation organizations that together have placed over 12,000 acres in permanent conservation easements. These easements pay farmers for the development rights to their land, which is approximately 75% of its marketrate value. This allows farmers to get equity out of their land while retaining title and ensures that the land will be preserved forever. If these landowners do decide to sell, their land is significantly less expensive to buy, making it more accessible to new farmers. Our mission is to "Protect Michigan farmland by shepherding it into the hands of new and existing farmers who can support a healthy, equitable and sustainable food system that honors agriculture as the foundation of strong communities". By making farmland easier to find, and by providing outreach and support services to help pass land and knowledge between experienced and new farmers,

we will increase the diversity and resilience of the agricultural industry, farming communities, and families. Our goal is to create a successful program in Washtenaw that can be replicated across the state.
